Celebrating Shrove Tuesday with a Pancake Supper

Good Shepherd opened its doors on Tuesday, Feb. 21, to welcome neighbors for a free community pancake supper. The reason for this fun was Shrove Tuesday, the last day of Epiphany: the day before Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent.

Many people give something up during the 40 days of Lent as a way to prepare for Easter. But on this night, also known as Mardi Gras, we gathered to enjoy pancakes, fried apples, and sausage, listen to New Orleans-style music, play a Lenten trivia game, and burn the palms from last



year's Palm Sunday service to

make the ashes for this year's Ash Wednesday. The church's dining room was beautifully trimmed in green, gold, and purple by Janet Locklear and Rev. Martha Clark. Walls were adorned with festive masks, tables were set in matching colors with decorative centerpieces, and guests were given multi-colored beaded necklaces and feathered masks by Lois Tapscott as they arrived. Donations for FISH were collected and delivered the next day.



Many hands make light work, and so was the case this evening. Lois and Judy Hall prepared the fried









apples ahead of time. Lee Ruddle, Bryan Zidek, and Tim Hall manned the pancake and sausage cooking stations, passing loaded plates to Penni Tidwell and Charlene Fu who served them to the seated guests. There was no shortage of all the decadent goodies being served up, and many take- away boxes were carried home.

Rev. Martha led all in a fun trivia game that explored Lent, Shrove Tuesday, and Mardi Gras. We learned



that "shrove" means to confess one's sins and that the three Mardi Gras colors stand for justice, faith, and power. Can you guess which color for which?

Following the trivia game, Janet's homemade King Cake was presented. The King Cake is so named to

remember the coming of the three kings (wise men) to Bethlehem to pay homage to the newborn king, baby Jesus, on Epiphany. The cake is baked in the shape of a ring to represent the circular route the wise men took to confuse King Herod. The cake even has a small plastic baby inside that is served in one of the slices of cake. Whoever finds the baby becomes the king or queen of the celebration. This year's winner was Judy Anderson!





After everyone had finished eating, we withdrew to the outdoor patio for the burning of the palms. This tradition also marks a circular path: between Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem for the Passover and the imposition of ashes to begin Lent, when we remember that "we are dust, and unto dust we shall return." The palm burning was made even more special by the attendance of one of our guests, Margaret Kidwell, who plays the shofar, which she brought along. As we prayed over the palm flames that leapt into the night sky, she gave a few haunting blows on the ram's horn, helping bring the evening's festivities to a worshipful close.

Bishop Harris to visit Good Shepherd

Due to COVID-19 and transitions in our diocese, it's been quite a few years since our last bishop visit at Good Shepherd. We are excited to announce that this long, three-and-a-half-year drought is over. The **Rt. Rev'd Gayle Elizabeth Harris**, newly appointed Assistant Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia, will celebrate Holy Eucharist with us for the Third Sunday of Easter, April 23, at our 11 a.m. service.

The Rt. Rev'd E. Mark Stevenson, Bishop of the Diocese of Virginia, announced the appointment of Harris as Assistant Bishop on Dec. 8, 2022, with plans to begin her ministry in the diocese on April 1, 2023. We are thrilled that she will be visiting Good Shepherd in her first month serving the diocese.

"Joyfully, I look forward to joining with you in the proclamation of the Gospel of love and reconciliation in the Diocese of Virginia and beyond" Bishop Harris says in a greeting to the people of the diocese. "I pray that our ministry



together in the name of Jesus, continues to empower us to be God's agents of healing and transformation in our own lives, and in the world."

Bishop Harris will play a lead role in broadening and deepening the diocese's formation ministries for both clergy and lay leaders. She will also share in the full range of Episcopal duties, including

Born in Cleveland, Ohio, Bishop Harris obtained her Master of Divinity degree from the Church Divinity School of the Pacific in Berkeley, California. She was

ordained to the priesthood in 1982 in the Diocese of Newark in New Jersey. From 1982 to 1992 she served in the Diocese of Washington, D.C., where she held positions on a range of diocesan leadership committees and at the National Cathedral.

In 1992, she was called as rector of St. Luke and St. Simon Cyrene Church in Rochester, New York, where she served until her June 1, 2002, election as Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Massachusetts. In addition to her duties as Suffragan Bishop, she led annual pilgrimages from the Diocese of Massachusetts to the Holy Land and was active in the Diocese of Massachusetts partnership with the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem.

Bishop Harris's involvement with the national Episcopal church has been quite extensive. She is a past Vice Chair of the Church Pension Fund Board of Trustees. She has served on the Board of Directors of CREDO, the Steering Committee for Bishops Working for a Just World and the Church Investment Group. Some other committees she has served are the House of Bishops' Pastoral Development Committee, the Convener of the Episcopal Bishops of African Descent, The Episcopal Church's Task Force on the Theology of Money, the House of Bishops' Planning Committee and of the Standing Committee on Interfaith and Ecumenical Relations of the Church.

Our first workday for the Prayer and Meditation Garden will be March 25. The first order of business will be clearing the garden of fall leaves and sticks. Once the trees and bushes are in, we will turn our attention to finishing up the path border with Allegheny spurge.

Start time for this workday will be 9 a.m. and we'll work until about noon. Additionally, on April 1, we would like to do another workday after we serve pancakes at the FISH Community Table. We'll do general grounds clean up, light planting, and mulching in anticipation of Palm Sunday and Easter. Many volunteers will be needed for both days, so grab your gardening tools and come join us. We look forward to dedicating this space for worship and the care of God's awesome creation!
